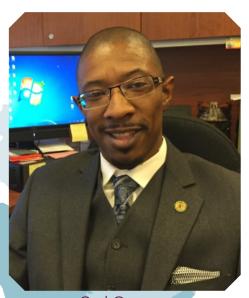
## Carl Gannon National President Union of Veterans Affairs Employees

Born and raised in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Carl has encountered his share of misfortune. Dropping out of high school in grade 10, Carl spent his teenage years as a misguided youth, who was in and out of trouble. Carl's early years were spent trying to find a purpose for his life while he struggled to find his way and place within society.

Eventually Carl was offered a position with the Department of Veterans' Affairs Canada as a Benefits Analyst and he finally found the purpose he has always searched for. The purpose was dual pronged and came in the form of genuinely helping veterans and their families and as a local union leader.

With Carl's election as National President of UVAE in 2014, history was made. Carl became the first Racially Visible component president in the almost 50-year history of the Public Service Alliance of Canada. At the time of his election, Carl was 33 years old, making him one of the youngest to ever hold this office and today is still considered a young worker.

As the President of UVAE, Carl has become one of the most recognizable voices with respect to issues facing Canadian Veterans and their families - and he is just getting started.
